

THE MINISTRY OF JESUS AS A MODEL FOR TEAM BELONG

We follow Christ’s example of ministry as we reach out to welcome and include individuals of all abilities in our own parish and school communities. All Christian Ministry is based on the ministry of Jesus. Below are nineteen of the twenty-six* Gospel accounts that show Jesus’ special concern for people with disabilities and his desire to affirm their dignity and worth and recognize their place in the community. The healing gospel narratives show us that:

- Jesus felt comfortable in the presence of people with disabilities even going to places where they gather
- Jesus listened to and responded to people with disabilities
- Jesus asked people with disabilities what they wanted rather than making assumptions about them
- Jesus took people with disabilities aside to interact on a personal level
- Jesus used healing touch to connect with people with disabilities
- Jesus continued to minister to people with disabilities in the face of opposition.

SCRIPTURE	SUMMARY	PASTORAL MINISTRY
John 5:1-9	Jesus visits the Bethesda pool, a place where people with disabilities gather, and asks a man who had been ill for 38 years, “Do you want to be well?”	Be comfortable around differences. Don’t make assumptions about people with disabilities. Ask what they would like or need.
Luke 13:10-17	Jesus calls to a woman with a curvature of the spine and lays his hands on her.	Caring touch.

SCRIPTURE	SUMMARY	PASTORAL MINISTRY
Luke 18:35-43, Mark 10:46-52	Jesus asks a man who is blind, "What do you want me to do for you?"	Don't make assumptions about people with disabilities. Ask what they would like or need.
Matthew 9:27-31, Matthew 9:30-33	Two men who are blind call out to Jesus. Jesus stops and calls to them and asks, "What do you want me to do for you?"	Respond to a call for help. Don't make assumptions about people with disabilities. Ask what they would like or need.
Mark 9:14-29, Luke 9:37-43 and Matthew 17:14-21	Jesus responds to a parent's pleas for help for his son with epilepsy. Jesus asks questions about the boy's condition. He heals the boy, takes his hand and helps him rise to stand.	Respond to a parent's call for help. Ask questions to gather more information. Caring touch.
John 9:1- 7	Jesus takes aside a man who is deaf and privately anoints him.	Personal encounter. Caring touch.
Mark 8:22-26	Jesus takes the hand of a man who is blind, leads him outside the village, places spittle on his eyes, asks if the man can see, places spittle on his eyes a second time.	Private encounter. Caring touch. Persistence. Ask the individual questions to evaluate ministry effectiveness.
Matthew 9:32-36	Jesus heals a man who could not speak. His heart is moved with compassion for the crowds because they are troubled and abandoned.	Recognize that everyone has disabilities and is in need of healing.

SCRIPTURE	SUMMARY	PASTORAL MINISTRY
Matthew 12:22-23, Matthew 12:9-14, Mark 3:1-6, Luke 6:6-11	Jesus continues his healing ministry in the face of opposition from the Pharisees.	Persevere in your ministry despite opposition.
Mark 2:1-12, Matt. 9:1-8, Luke 5:17-26	Jesus heals a man who is paralyzed and lowered through the roof by his friends.	The intervention of friends creates access and belonging.
